

Classroom Animals

Topic: School and community
Curriculum link: Living Things; Society and Environment
Text type: Instructional
Reading level: 11
Word count: 328
High-frequency words: you, how, to, look, them, they, what, eat, about
Vocabulary: classroom, animals, tadpoles, frogs, fish, rabbits, canaries, silkworms, plants, insects, tank, bowl, flakes, cage, vegetables, pellets, hay, perch, shoe box, mulberry, leaves
Possible literacy focus:
Understanding written instructions.
Learning to understand, read and write written imperatives.

Follow-up activities

Innovating on the text

Ask each child to choose an animal that they have had experience in looking after. Ask them to write a list of what needs to be done to look after that animal. Encourage them to use action verbs. They can also illustrate their writing and their work can be compiled into a class book called "How to look after a pet".

Most popular pet

Ask the children to pick an animal from the book that they would most like to have in their classroom. On a piece of paper, have children write the name of this animal and their reason for choosing it. Collate the responses, tally them and write up the data for the children to see. For example:

Animal	Number of votes
Silkworms	5
Tadpoles and frogs	3
Fish	4
Rabbits	11
Canaries	6

Discuss the results: Which animal was the most popular? Why do you think this was so? Which was the least popular animal? Why do you think this was so? Which animal do you think would need the most care? Was it a popular animal? Which do you think would need the least amount of care? Was it a popular choice?

Choose me, choose me!

Write the names of the animals from the book onto cards (silkworms, tadpoles and frogs, fish, rabbits, canaries). Children take turns to choose a card and 'become' the animal written on that card. They need to persuade the rest of the group that they should be the classroom pet.

- 4. Present your book to the class.




Model home
